Reading through this newsletter, you will see that there is a lot happening at Council and in the broader community. You will find information about projects that will be undertaken in this financial year, events coming up and more.

This includes the 17 new community projects that have been given the green light, following the annual community grant program. Encompassing the Coleambally Solar Farm Grants, Lions Club Grants and Council's grants, together, these grants inject \$42,000 into the community.

Our new and improved waste management collection service is now well underway. It is a steep learning

curve for us all with the introduction of organics (FOGO) collection across the whole Council area and recycling for Jerilderie. I urge you to take the time to familiarise yourself with suitable items for each bin. If you are unsure, consult our website, contact us at Council or err on the side of caution and put it in the red-lid garbage bin. I acknowledge the support of the NSW EPA for the grant we received to assist with the FOGO roll-out.

Still on the subject of waste, our travelling Waste to Art Exhibition will soon wrap up. Congratulations to the winning and highly commended entries and thank you to everyone who submitted an entry in the competition. Our Council footprint is rich in both talent and enthusiasm.

Lastly, I would like to take this



opportunity to thank many of the Murrumbidgee community who offered congratulations and acknowledged my King's Birthday 2023 Order of Australia Medal. It is a great honour and lovely to be acknowledged. It is my privilege to be involved in Local Government and has been an even greater privilege to represent and lead our local Council.

Gauging interest in roadside rural waste collection



We are currently surveying people who live on rural properties in our Council area to gather feedback on the demand for a roadside waste collection service. It is proposed to collect garbage (general waste) and recycling (glass, paper and cardboard, some plastics, household steel and aluminium items).

Indicative pricing is a maximum of \$495 per annum if this service is provided fortnightly using 240L bins or \$320 per annum if this service is provided monthly using 360L bins (based on current prices).

If there is sufficient support for the service, it will commence on 1 July 2024.

The survey closes Wednesday 9 August.

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Toganmain project gathers momentum

It's said that Australia was built on the sheep's back, reflecting a time when shearing sheds were the centre of the community and wool played an integral part in our nation's development.

Historic old shearing sheds, such as Toganmain Woolshed, between Darlington Point and Hay, are precious links to a bygone era.

Toganmain's history dates back to 1875 and is the largest remaining woolshed in the Riverina region. The shed holds the Australian record, when in September 1876 a total of 202,292 sheep were shorn by 92 blade shearers.

Unfortunately, the shed fell into disrepair, but a dedicated restoration committee, aptly named the "Friends of Toganmain" have the vision to develop

an immersive curated museum for all to enjoy. The shed is not currently open to the public.

Would you like to help restore this unique part of history?

Congratulations Mayor Ruth McRae OAM!

Our warmest congratulations to Councillor Ruth McRae who was recognised for her long-standing commitment to local government and the Murrumbidgee community with an Order of Australia Medal in the King's Birthday Honours List.

Mayor McRae said she was deeply honoured to receive the award. "It is an unexpected honour and very humbling".

Councillor McRae entered public office in 2004 when she saw local government as a credible vehicle to represent the Jerilderie community and the wider region. This stemmed from her diverse interests in education, early education, health,

disability access and services, aged care, sporting clubs and water.

Councillor McRae paid tribute to her family who made it possible for her extended tenure in local government, "To have been able to be engaged for as long as I have has only been possible because I have been wholeheartedly supported by my family.

"And without sounding trite if you love where you live and your community works with and supports you, the very real challenges are just that", she said.

"To be nominated by someone from the community I love is probably the most thrilling aspect of this honour," she said.

A triple celebration

It's a special year for Jerilderie's St Stephen's Anglican Church and parish.

With the congregation recently holding a service to mark 150 years since the creation of the Urana and Jerilderie Parish, 126 years since the foundation stone for St Stephen's Church of England was laid and, although a little early, the 125th Anniversary of the official opening of the Church on 20 December 1898.

Launched on the day was the History of St Stephen's book, researched and compiled by local historian, Laurie Henery. Copies are available for purchase from the Anglican Opportunity Shop.



Great start to three bins!

Residents and businesses have generally embraced the move to the new three bin waste collection service.

The three bins we now have are:



1. Food Organics and Garden Organics FOGO (green lid) – Goes to Wormtech



What goes in your FOGO bin?

- ✓ Food scraps
- ✓ Garden organics
- ✓ Compostable plastic kitchen caddy liners that comply with Australian Standard AS4736-2006 (for commercial composting) used to collect and transfer food waste to the FOGO bin

Make sure you remove the food waste from its packaging.

Common contaminants in the green lid bin waste collections are soft plastics such as plastic bags and food packaging. Initial contamination rates have been around 8-11%.

2. Recycling (yellow lid) – Goes to Kurrajong Recycling



What goes in your recycling bin?

Please rinse items first and put lids in separately

- ✓ Aluminium trays, cans and foil (scrunched up to the size of an orange)
- ✓ Glass bottles and jars
- ✓ All paper, cardboard, newspaper, magazines and advertising brochures (not shredded) (no smaller than a business card)
- ✓ Steel cans and containers, including aerosols
- ✓ Rigid plastics in recycling triangle: 1, 2, 5 only
- ✗ NO items tied up in plastic bags.



3. Garbage (red lid) – Goes to landfill

- ✓ Over 4 tonnes of organic waste is being diverted from landfill every week and being made into high grade compost.



Why is it important to sort right and reduce contamination?

By putting the correct items in each bin, we are keeping the life cycle of products going, meaning we are using products more efficiently. It also means we are avoiding additional sorting and disposal costs to get rid of unsuitable materials. We are also increasing the lifespan of our landfill waste cells. We have adopted this process as part of the NSW Government's strategy of developing a circular economy. The concept is that products are continually reused or recycled/composted, rather than sent to landfill where they may take many years to break down. The introduction of FOGO collection is mandatory for NSW Councils.

New telehealth service available after hours

Residents in Murrumbidgee Council area can now use a free Health Access Out of Hours GP telehealth service.

How does it work?

The service is able to treat presentations like abdominal pain, fainting, migraines, colds & flu, fever, sore throat, rashes, vomiting and diarrhoea, so you don't have to go to hospital.

You will be triaged and, if eligible, an on-call GP will return your call promptly and provide a consultation via video or telephone. If needed, an eScript will be generated electronically and sent to you. Your GP will be sent a summary of the presentation.
