COMMUNITY GRANTS 2018

Applications are open for community groups to apply for a grant under the Murrumbidgee Council Community Grants 2018 program.

Applicants should read the Community Grants Guidelines before making an application. The guidelines and application form are available for download on Council's website www.murrumbidgee.nsw.gov.au or from Council's offices at Darlington Point, Coleambally and Jerilderie.

The maximum grant available is \$3,000, with a total amount of \$16,000 being available.

Community groups who may require funding assistance throughout the year should make their application through this program.

The closing date for applications is 12.00 noon on Friday 15 June 2018. Late applications will not be considered.

JOINT ORGANISATIONS

Murrumbidgee Council has joined the Riverina and Murray Joint Organisation (RAMJO).

JO's are the State Government's way of formalising regional co-operation between Councils. The Government made it clear they intend to engage with Councils as groups, in strategic planning particularly. The Government is looking for Councils to provide advocacy as groups. Government departments are keen to engage with Local Government at regional levels into the future on a more formal basis.

JO's are a legislated structure arising out of Councils' creation of regional groups of Councils, in our case RAMROC, over the last 25 years', which have provided a successful forum for Councils to work cooperatively.

As a smaller Council in the area, Murrumbidgee towns are set to benefit in very real ways. One of the most important issues for Murrumbidgee is to grow the relationship with Roads and Maritime Services (RMS). Council's aim is to access more contract work on the State's Main Roads within the Council area. This could mean more funding for roads like Kidman Way and Newell Highway, roads connecting Murrumbidgee's three towns.




DARLINGTON POINT RIVERINA CLASSIC CATCH & RELEASE COMPETITION

The Darlington Point Riverina Classic Catch and Release Fishing Competition is a not for profit organisation, run by community volunteers. It began in 2014 with members of the Coleambally/ Darlington Point APEX Club, and is now run by its own subcommittee. The Committee prides itself on offering one of the best prize pools for inland fishing competitions in NSW.

Every year the Riverina Classic aims to raise money and awareness for charities that assist our local communities. Since 2014, \$93,000 has gone to support locals suffering from prostate cancer, motor neurone disease, CAN ASSIST, and this year funds were donated to Rural Outreach Counselling.


Rural Outreach Counselling (ROC) is a not for profit, community funded, mental health counselling support service focusing on sufferers and their families in rural and remote Australia. Their



families, free of charge, to assess those in need, provide strategies for beginning recovery, and support sufferers one-on-one. In addition to donating to charity every year, the Committee also concentrate their efforts on re-stocking the waterways of the Murrumbidgee River with fingerlings of Murray Cod and Golden Perch in order to help secure a sustainable fishing future. Since 2014 there have been 36,000 fingerlings released into the Murrumbidgee River system

> The Committee is made up of only a handful of volunteers who donate their time and put in a great deal of effort throughout each year to ensure a successful competition weekend each February. I myself, joined for the 2017 competition. I personally think the Riverina Classic is a great way to help the community and have fun with family and friends at the same time.

RECALL OF G8SALE POOL FENCE LATCHES

SafeTech Hardware Australia has recalled the following products (non-compliant latches): SafeTech Top Pull Pool Gate Latch (Key Lockable), G8Safe Top Pull Pool Gate Latch (Key Lockable), SafeTech TriLatch (Key Lockable) and G8Safe TriLatch (Key Lockable).

The non-compliant latches do not comply with AS 1926.1-2012 (even though the labelling suggests the latches are compliant) because their design allows the non-compliant latches to be locked in the 'open' position. This is a breach of clause 2.4.2.1 (b) of AS 1926.1- 2012. Please visit the ACCC website for further details or contact Council's Planning Department.

CELEBRATING DARLINGTON POINT'S DIVERSE HISTORY

-MUSEUM OPEN DAY-

A successful Open Day was held at the Darlington Point Museum on Sunday 13 May, attended by a steady stream of visitors, both local and from further afield: Jerilderie, Berrigan and the NSW Central Coast.

The theme of this year's event was 'Many Paths to the Point'; a celebration of some of the cultures shared by people in our community. The main feature was the display of Warangesda Aboriginal Mission, being a selection of the items that had been part of the impressive Warangesda exhibition at Griffith Art Gallery in July 2017, and supported by a number of Aboriginal artefacts on loan from Darlington Point School.

Other displays were of colourful Russian traditional costumes and a selection of handcrafted items from that country, while Holland was represented by a collection of memorabilia. A story board about the Chinese presence in Darlington Point and district in the early 20th century recalled a largely forgotten aspect of local history.

The above attractions were staged in the former Council Chambers, the building that has been the main venue for displays now for several years. In addition, this year the old Courthouse building was the setting for the display of some photographs from the Museum's ever-growing collection. Event organisers, Heritage Darlington Point, are planning to gradually upgrade buildings on the site to maximise their potential.

Following In Ned Kelly's Footsteps

Jerilderie is well known for its strong connection to bushranger Ned Kelly-one of Australia's icons. Jerilderie is the only town in NSW featured in the Ned Kelly Saga and is the home of the famous Jerilderie Letter, dictated to Joe Byrne by Ned Kelly. Jerilderie has more surviving authentic Kelly sites than anywhere else along the Ned Kelly Touring Route (www.nedkellytouringroute.com.au). With 6 of the buildings directly associated with the 1879 visit standing it's a fantactic insight into how the town

still standing, it's a fantastic insight into how the town looked when Ned visited.



Over the years, this has attracted many visitors to the town. A recent visitor to Jerilderie, Neil Jordon from Gilgandra, is one of those people with a strong interest in Ned and his Gang and, in pursuit of that interest, Neil rode into town recently with his two horses, Tom and Mick, to stay at the Showgrounds and visit the various Kelly sites. Prior to visiting Jerilderie, Neil has visited Beechworth, Glenrowan and Yackandandah in Victoria following Ned and the Kelly Gang.

History of the Murrumbidgee Community Experimental Demonstration Farm

The Farm is based on Farm 2026 Ercildoune Road Coleambally. The first crop was planted in 1996 by the Coleambally Lions Club, and crops have been planted to benefit the community ever since. Community organisations grow crops on the farm and after harvest distributions are passed on to them. Until the end of June 2017 over \$1,762,771 has be distributed via services clubs, schools and sporting organisations. This has made a huge impact on our local community, not just with these funds but also with flow back from payments to contractors and farm input businesses. Trials and field days also take place. This research is important for the future of our area.

In speaking with Alison, she advised the Farm is a wonderful place, and she has had the pleasure of being involved over the past 14 years. She commended the many community minded Committee members and 3 excellent Chairmen during her time – Keith Burge, Ian Sutherland and Steve Burgess. Alison took the opportunity to wish Naomi Jones all the best in taking over the role of Secretary. "It is a great community initiative and invaluable asset in our Council area, and I know the farm will



only go from strength to strength" said Alison.

Chasing Down the Dollars

In recent weeks Murrumbidgee Council has been chasing \$3.8million allocated to our Council area for well-supported and developed projects that meet the requirements of the Stronger Country Communities Fund (SCCF) Program. On 4 May, eight community infrastructure projects from Council's Priority Projects Register and two projects put forward by community Sports Clubs, were submitted to the Program for funding. The NSW State Government will be assessing the projects for alignment with their guidelines. Announcement of successful applications can be expected later in the year.

In line with the SCCF Program instructions, Council prioritised and submitted more applications than the amount of funding available. And to fit with the Program guidelines there was a special focus on submitting sporting infrastructure projects. Allocation of these funds to projects is a decision of the NSW State Government.

Over coming weeks, the NSW Government will be conducting phone polls to 'check-in' with the community and gauge support for these Stronger Country Communities Fund projects.

Murrumbidgee projects (with estimated funding amounts) under consideration are:

Jerilderie:

- Replacement of the 25mtr swimming pool including concourse, filtration and backwash systems (\$1.2m)
- ◆ A new building for Jerilderie Preschool including facilities for Long Day Care (\$994k)
- ◆ An automated Watering System to lessen the need for volunteer greenkeeping at the Jerilderie Golf Course
 (\$65k)

Coleambally:

- ◆ New regional quality Amenities and Change Room facilities adjacent to No.1 Oval at the Coleambally Sports Precinct (\$998k)
- ◆ Refurbishment of the 'Stadium' building, food service and spectator areas at the Coleambally Sports Precinct (\$320k)
- ◆ A new and expanded Sweatbox Community Gym (\$579k)

Darlington Point:

- ◆ Refurbished and expanded change rooms, amenities area, kiosk and spectator area at Darlington Point Sports Ground (\$539k)
- ◆ A native garden and cultural space opening onto Carrington St at the Waddi Community Centre (\$215k)
- ◆ Upgrade and improvements at the Town Beach, including widening the current boat ramp and improving access and seating areas (\$260k)
- ◆ Automatic watering system to redevelop the Darlington Point Golf Course (\$191k)

Council understands not all above projects will be funded. Opportunities for alternative funding will be actively sought where an appropriate grant can be found. Council is also actively pursuing grants for other projects that are listed on our Priority Projects Register, or that are raised through community consultation processes. In May this has included helping community groups with Community Building Partnership applications, and Office of Responsible Gambling Infrastructure grant applications.
