



Projects in progress

Here's an update on the major capital works taking place across the council area.

Brolga Place Upgrade, Coleambally

We received 145 responses to the community survey on street furniture. We are now finalising the procurement plan to integrate community feedback with the project's budget.



Civic Hall Extension, **Jerilderie**

The building is taking shape with all formation brickwork, the steel structure, ramps and concrete floor in place.

Young Street Subdivision, **Darlington Point**

Kerb and guttering is underway. Once this is complete, the council team will be constructing the road network throughout the subdivision. Ouotations have been received for the sewer rising main and the new water main.

Netball Change Room Monash Oval, Jerilderie

The framework is complete and bricklaying is in progress.

Flood restoration works on our road network

Stage 1 of this program is continuing with road crews currently repairing the extensive damage to our gravel road network. Stage 2 will involve restoration of the sealed road network.

Road resealing programs

Currently underway across the council road network.

Bob notches up a half-century with local government

Bob Adamson began his career as a mail clerk at Jerilderie Shire Council in 1974. At that time, the office was very different from what it is now.

All documents were handwritten or prepared manually on unsophisticated equipment. Typewriters were used to prepare typed documents and a large manual calculator was used to perform calculations. Transactions were recorded in a big handwritten ledger book. Computers were non-existent! Bob remembers there were about 8

people working in the office at the time, covering all of the council's services. He comments, "We were all multi-skilled,"! We had 3 typists who typed everything, even all the rates notices, which were prepared in duplicate so council could keep a copy.

Bob said, "In 1979, we finally got a state-of-the-art NCR499 data processing system,". The machine operated with magnetic cassettes for storage and magnetic ledger cards. It only had the capacity to process content for one job at a time. Bob was the Assistant Operator of the NCR499

so worked on the system whenever the main operator was away.

Over the years, Bob worked in a variety of different roles, including creditors and stores, before moving to rates in the mid-1980s. For Bob, the most valuable part of his 50 years with the council has been working for the community in which he is a part of.

As Bob transitions to retirement, he has an exciting overseas trip coming up. His racehorses also keep him busy, with a new 3-year-old filly in training and his beloved Zarsupreme still performing well despite approaching the end of his racing career. Bruce, as Bob affectionately calls him, has won 8 races during his impressive career.



Sort FOGO right every time

Every month, we receive a report from Wormtech, the company that accepts our food and garden organic (FOGO) waste.

The report includes statistics for the month regarding the amount of waste, level of contamination, and types of contaminants. Contaminants are items that cannot be accepted by organic composting companies.

There are strict guidelines about what can be accepted by composting companies. The need for this was highlighted recently when a Sydney resource recovery firm supplied asbestos-contaminated mulch that was then used in public places.

At the micro level, we all have an essential role to play in ensuring we put the correct items in the green-lid FOGO bin.

Here is a snapshot of the audit of our FOGO waste for February:

- Total mass of FOGO delivered for February: 28.44 tonnes
- Percentage contamination: 4.5%
- Types of contaminants: hard and soft plastics, bags of general garbage

The good news is that the contamination rate of 4.5% is very good, particularly when considering that we are new to the FOGO system. However, the contaminants have been the same for every month since we introduced the service.

To improve the contamination rate, we can take the following steps:

- Put hard plastics in the yellow-lid recycling bin if they have the numbers 1, 2, and 5 in the recycling triangle stamped on them. All other hard plastics should go in the red-lid garbage bin.
- Put general garbage waste in the redlid garbage bin. If your red-lid garbage bin is full, consider checking if there are items that could go in either FOGO or recycling. Check the flyer we sent to all households or the website for information on what can and can't go in each of your bins.

Shout out to the members of Jerilderie APEX! The 20th Jerilderie Working Dog Auction was held in February and was very successful. Sixty two dogs were sold with the top dog fetching \$16,000. The club uses the annual event as a fundraiser.

Club members have also been working hard to restore the Jerilderie APEX mini-rail following the flood damage that occurred in 2023. The popular activity was up and running for the Australia Day celebrations. The club hopes to eventually open one Sunday every month.

All the fun of the fair

Jerilderie's Fun Fair in early March was a great event! The Fun Fair is coordinated and managed by a group of dedicated parent volunteers from St Joseph's Jerilderie Primary School. The funds raised support the children at St Joseph's Jerilderie Primary school, by funding resources, excursions and more.

The next fun fair will be held on Saturday 1 March 2025.

Riverina Classic Catch and Release Fishing Competition

Congratulations to the organising committee for another highly successful event, held from 9-11 February in Darlington Point. A total of 817 entrants took part, with 1,300 catches over the three day event. Rural Outreach Counselling benefited from a \$20,000 donation. In excess of \$200,000 has been raised for local charities since the event started in 2014. As a catch and release event, the committee also has a strong environmental focus with about 5,000 fingerlings released into the Murrumbidgee River this year.
