Wiradjuri Walk is a vibrant addition to Darlington Point

Darlington Point's Fig Tree Park has come alive with an explosion of colour thanks to the Wiradjuri Walk project.

The name 'Wiradjuri Walk' symbolises the journey we've all made through history, starting with the First Nations people more than 60,000 years ago and continuing today in 2021.

The project features public art created by Kerri Weymouth, Bohie Palacek and the Waddi Art Group; historical photos; storyboards capturing the area's history and new entrance statements. It has also resulted in more clearly defined walking and cycling trails in the precinct. These now join up with the 1.8 km Goanna Walking Track, which is a meandering path beside the river through red gum and black box forests, and finishing at the mystical 'Bunyip Hole'.

This project has been supported by many, many people in our community. We thank each and every one of you for your assistance.

We have thoroughly researched this project and the historical information that is presented is correct as taken directly from original published material. It is acknowledged that there may be minor discrepancies between sources given the limitations of reporting at the time.

This project was proudly funded by the NSW Government through the Streets as Shared Spaces Program and Murrumbidgee Council.

Murrumbidgee Council ratepayers will see rates aligned across the Council area

As a merged Council, this is a natural transition that will see a uniform rating structure across the whole Council area.

What is Rates Harmonisation?

It is the process of redistributing rates across the Council area so that rates are the same for the individual sub-categories (based on the unimproved land value of a property).

It will replace the existing system that used different formulas devised by the former Murrumbidgee Shire and Jerilderie Shire Councils.

This will result in the rating and fee structures being aligned across the Council area.

We have worked hard to ensure the new rating structure achieves the following:

- The rates burden is distributed uniformly across our Council area
- The financial impacts on ratepayers are minimised
- The way we apply rates is simplified and made more efficient

Every sub-category of ratepayers will now have a base rate and the minimum rate has been abolished.

When does Rates Harmonisation begin?

It has commenced this financial year and is reflected in the 2021-22 Operational Plan (budget) and in the first rates instalment.

Does Council receive additional revenue by harmonising rates?

The process of harmonising rates across Murrumbidgee Council area will not increase the total rates revenue collected by Council. It simply redistributes the rates more uniformly across our Council area.

The total rates revenue remains the same, other than the standard annual increase permitted by the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART). The harmonisation process takes the current total general rate and apportions it differently across revised subcategories.

Will services change in our Council area?

The services that Council provides will not change. We will continue to provide the same high quality services traditionally provided. Your rates provide an important source of revenue to allow Council to provide these services.

Roads and capital projects at the forefront of budget

Council spending for the 2021-22 financial year will continue to focus on roads and capital projects.

The combined draft Operational Plan for 2021-22, containing proposed rates, fees and charges, and the Delivery Program for 2021-25 were adopted at the June Council meeting.

The budget outlines Council's spending in the 2021-22 financial year, which will include capital expenditure of \$15 million.

Big ticket capital items include \$3.2 million for water supply upgrades and renewals (subject to grant funding), \$3 million for the Darlington Point subdivision development, \$2 million for roads reconstruction and a further \$2.4 million for renewal works, including resealing roads, gravel resheeting, footpaths, culverts and kerbs and gutter renewals.

To fund these significant projects, Council will utilise anticipated revenue of \$17 million, including rates, annual charges, user charges and fees. A further \$7 million of capital grants will also be an important source of income for Council.

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Under construction – Council projects

There's some exciting capital projects happening across our area and here's some of the major ones:

Bencubbin Avenue reconstruction, Coleambally

This project is funded by the Australian and NSW Governments, as well by Council. Work is now underway.

Darlington Point Amenities Block

A new amenities block with offroad parking will be built along Carrington Street (Kidman Way), in front of the cemetery. It will include a lift and change facility to cater for people with severe disabilities who are unable to use current standard accessible toilets. The project will be funded with a \$349,980 grant from the Australian Government.

Coleambally Sporting Precinct redevelopment

Stage two of the redevelopment is now underway. This includes new player and umpire change

rooms and amenities, upgrades to the existing Clubhouse including the amenities and scorer's box, additions to the netball change rooms, including upgraded amenities, a gymnasium, upgrades to the youth hall and new cricket nets.

The work is being undertaken by Kennedy Builders Pty Ltd at a cost of \$1,889,646 (GST inclusive). The project is funded by the NSW Government.

Council has also applied for funding to carry out alterations and additions to the existing squash courts.

Stage one included a new \$434,400 amenities building and junior change rooms at Number 2 oval, funded by NSW Government. It was officially opened by Mayor Ruth McRae and Coleambally Junior Football and Netball Club President Danny Graham on 24 April 2021.

Jerilderie Early Learning Centre

The new centre will provide a 48 place purpose-built early education facility.

This project has been funded by the NSW Government, as well as grants sourced by the ELC Committee. Construction firm, Dezign, has been engaged by Murrumbidgee Council to undertake the project.

The first sod was officially turned on the project on 28 May 2021. A highlight of the event was the beautiful spades decorated by the preschool children. The new centre will be finished by January 2022.

Super-fast digital connectivity for our region

\$1.2 million will be injected into telecommunications in our area through the Federal Government's Regional Connectivity Program (RCP). The project will add new 'true broadband' technology on three existing towers and build two new 45m telco towers along the Newell Highway and Kidman Way.

It will deliver better coverage across up to 80% of our Council area, boosting Internet and mobile data to over 3,000 residents and 430 businesses. Also funding the project are Field Solutions Group, Murrumbidgee Council, Nokia (technology partner), Altina Wildlife Park, Cavaso Farming, Cotton Australia and Coleambally Irrigation.

For the first time in Australia's Census history, there will be a window of time to complete the Census, rather than a single night. This means you can fill the form in at a time that best suits you. The Census can be completed online or by using the paper form.

Reminder letters will be delivered to households from mid-August 2021 for households that have not responded. The results of the Census will be released from June 2022 onwards.

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Statement from John Scarce, General Manager

Commonwealth Home Support Programme

It has been brought to my attention that misinformation is circulating in the community about how the service has been run, specifically comments about corruption and illegal practices. These comments have been aimed at Council employees and volunteer drivers.

I have in my capacity as General Manager and with my professional qualifications as a Fellow of the Australian Society of Certified Practicing Accountants (CPA), carried out an extensive audit of the service. Specific focus was on community transport.

I can assure you if I had found any evidence of corruption or illegal practice, I am duty bound by my position as General Manager and as a member of CPA Australia, to report any such activity, even if only a suspicion.

You can take from the fact that there have been and will not be any referrals to the Police, Office of Local Government or ICAC, over my audit finding, that there was nothing to indicate any corruption or illegal practices.

Did you know we have dog free zones in our Council area?

Your loveable pooch is just not welcome at the following places:

- Coleambally sports precinct oval 1 and 2
- Monash Park
- Darlington Point Recreation Oval

The only exception is people with a disability who are entitled to be accompanied by a certified assistance animal.



On 5 May 2021 when speaking to CHSP Clients, it was explained that things can be delivered differently and not cost the ratepayer large sums of money to deliver the service.

The CHSP staff go over and above everyday wearing their heart on their sleeve to assist our CHSP clients. At no time was it ever suspected, nor did I find anything illegal or corrupt in how they carried out their duties. To hear the malicious gossip and innuendo about these dedicated and highly valued employees is deeply disturbing to them and myself as their employer.

The volunteer drivers are the unsung heroes, using their own vehicles and donating their time to ensure those who needed a lift got a lift. At no time did I suspect or find any illegal or corrupt activity on their part.

The CHSP staff and volunteer drivers should be applauded, not ridiculed. They were focused on providing the best outcome for the clients, nothing else, and definitely not engaged in anything illegal or corrupt.

Yes, the community transport service will change slightly, Council will use their own cars, which run at a lower cost and the volunteer drivers will be the drivers of the council cars. We will only have one car available in Coleambally and one in Darlington Point, so booking early will be paramount, so staff can manage the service and attempt to accommodate every request.



Will you be making an application for development soon?

With hard copy applications for development a thing of the past, we're making it easier for residents and developers to use the online NSW Government Planning Portal.

The Planning Portal has been developed as the central electronic platform for all councils across NSW to receive applications. While it became mandatory for all Councils to use this system from 1 July, we moved to this system in December last year.

It means that all individuals, organisations or industry professionals, from home builders, to certifiers, project developers and government agencies must use the portal to make an application.

To make it easier for people to use the online system, we offer a prelodgement advisory service. Anyone thinking of lodging an application can meet with staff, either in person or over the phone, and we can clearly outline the steps involved and all the documentation that is required.

This speeds up the whole application process and avoids the

need for additional information to support the application.

We are also assisting locals to lodge an application by providing computers (funded by the NSW Government) at each of our offices, with staff available to assist with the application process. Please make an appointment to do this.

A big advantage of the online portal is that developers and residents can access planning services and information from anywhere at any time, rather than just during business hours, as has happened in the past.

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Recycling the tricky things

Our Council has recently been participating in a campaign with the NSW Government and RAMJO to promote the Community Recycling Centres that are available in our Council area.

We have a free service for the safe disposal of problem household waste at our Jerilderie and Coleambally Waste Depots.

Items you can drop off for disposal are:

- Gas bottles
- Fire extinguishers
- Paint
- Fluoro globes and tubes
- Car batteries (you can also drop these off at the Coleambally Men's Shed)

- Household batteries
- Motor oils
- Other oils
- Smoke detectors

Many of these materials can be reused and recycled if processed correctly. Recycling helps our environment because it saves water, energy and natural resources.

In addition to this, we have recycling stations at each of our Council offices where you can drop off the following:

- household batteries
- printer cartridges
- mobile phones and accessories
- fluoro bulbs
- smoke detectors
